Despite Wyre Archaeology's temporary hold on digs, commercial digging has continued on several major infrastructure projects such as HS2 and on local developments. The Windy Harbour to Skippool A585 Road Improvement scheme started in March this year and aims to be completed by summer 2023 at a cost of £150m. A team from Oxford Archaeology (North) led by Fraser Brown has already uncovered important evidence of human occupation of the area dating back between14,000 and 5,000 years. These finds were exhibited at public events in Poulton earlier this year and Fraser gave a fascinating talk at the Lancaster University Archaeology Forum in March. It's reported that archaeological work will continue as the project moves forward and we hope to be able to get Fraser to talk at one of our meetings when we resume. The North-west has some surprising archaeology!

Another specific example of our area's surprising archaeology was the discovery several years ago of a Roman Auxilliary fort at Burscough (Fort in the Wood). Although its presence was suspected in the early 18C, it was only in 2003 that physical evidence was unearthed and only in 2013 that excavation began. The site has remained a closely-guarded secret until fairly recently. However the site has at last been scheduled by English Heritage: https://historicengland.org.uk/listing/the-list/list-


This follows what appears to have been some action by heavy digging machinery on part of the site (*Picture: Fort in the Wood Facebook*). Apparently Police intervention was needed to stop the work. It's unfortunate that the site wasn't scheduled when first reported a few years ago.

The existence of this fort has significant implications in regard to understanding the Roman occupation of Britain and for the Northwest in particular, an area generally believed to be poor for Roman period sites. Of course the scheduling of the site means that excavation may be restricted and at the present time, experts are assessing the damage caused by the groundwork.

The virus crisis has forced cancellation of Fort in the Wood's summer dig school but their website indicates that they hope to offer a school next year. See www.fortinthewood.org.uk and Facebook for information.

One of our new members reported a find of flints in a field by the River Brock. These are part of a large scatter over a fairly small area of the field and are in largish broken chunks.

Flint is not a natural deposit in this area; the nearest source is probably the North Yorkshire coast where

there are chalk deposits. If anyone has an idea of why flints should be lying in a Claughton field, please let us know. The Viking burial mound is not that far away – a connexion perhaps?

POSSIBLE CHANGE OF MEETING VENUE
