


NEWSLETTER 46 SEPTEMBER 2021

September is following August as a busy month, which is great news in one way, but poses some challenges in others. Next month sees the close of our official meeting season until February (fingers crossed there are no blocks on that!) but we may still get a few dig days in.

Dig News

Great excitement, as reported in the last newsletter, about an invitation from a Forton landowner to investigate a suspected section of the Roman road running through her land and an accompanying suggestion that workmen some years ago found what might have been a 'shrine'.



Members of our Planning Group (Chris, Mike and Helen) met at the location and were positive quite about what they although saw, Lidar expert David Ratledge suggested thev were out of line sorry – slightly off the line, and Helen and Andy who arranged a metal-

detecting foray on the site found nothing of interest. Andy managed to put in a few test pits on neighbouring land which seemed to confirm David's views and he and David were able, over a couple of field walks and with a brilliant stroke of luck involving a field drain, to confirm the route. We hope to be able to excavate near this site before the end of this dig season.

Meanwhile, we still have the Brock Cottage dig, which has been on a back burner for a few weeks and a potential dig at Wardleys Creek.

Our main challenge is having a sufficient number of diggers to take on these projects. Despite having almost 50 'active' members we struggle to get more than 6 out into the field, a problem also shared with other field work groups.

If you'd like to participate but are anxious about experience, equipment or ability, don't be put off. No prior experience is needed; we provide basic kit and generally there's always a role for any level of ability or fitness.

We'd like to have a 'register' of members who are willing to take part in digs and who would agree to the Planning Group having their email addresses. At present members' contact details are shared only with the Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer and al communication goes via the Secretary. If the Planning Group held a register of diggers' email addresses it would make communication about digs much easier.

Society News

Our first 'ordinary meeting' (the previous month's was the AGM) took place on 15th September. The business side was kept brief as our guest speaker was Fraser Brown, Regional Manager at Oxford Archaeology North based in Lancaster and Project Manager for the archaeological investigation on the Windy Harbour-Skippool A585 Road

Improvement Project. Fraser described the fascinating archaeology of the Lytham-Skippool Valley that once separated the coastal area around present-day Blackpool from the higher land to the west. Over thousands of years the valley had been subject to successive marine incursions as sea levels rose then fell, sealing organic and non-organic materials under layers of silt and peat. The site is of national importance, offering a unique insight into the transition from the hunter gatherer society of the late Mesolithic to the farming society of the Neolithic.
