Our next meeting on 20 April is the Annual General Meeting. This is when we look back over the past year's activities and plan for the 2022 season. March has already seen a fair amount of activity. As you may have read in the Wigan AS Newsletter recently distributed, a geophys survey was carried out at **Hurst Grange Park**, the former site of a large house and estate created in 1848 as the home of a

local judge, William Hulton, and now a public green space. The estate, and others, on the hill above the River Ribble provided for the gentry a rural



retreat from the grime of industrial Preston. You can read more about the site at https://www.southribble.gov.uk/hurstgrangepark

A group of local volunteers, Friends of Hurst Grange Park was formed in 2003 to help maintain and improve the amenities of the park and in 2014 formed a project team specifically to work on the renovation of the Coach House, the only remaining building of the former mansion. Working closely with South Ribble Borough Council, the group was able to secure significant Heritage Lottery funding and have now converted the Coach House into a café and event space. We were approached by the FoHGP early in March to ask if we might be able to help the group trace the footprint of the original mansion under the landscaped park. At a site meeting we suggested that a geophys survey would be the best way to begin, followed — depending on the results — by an excavation to reveal any existing archaeology.

Since we don't have the necessary equipment, we approached our colleagues at Wigan Archaeological Society who have helped us in the past and they were able to carry out what proved to be a very successful survey.

The image below, courtesy of Wigan Archaeological Society, shows the dark shadows of the GRS plot overlaid in red with approximate outline of existing archaeology.

We now hope to carry out an excavation to reveal exactly what the features shown by the survey may be.

Meanwhile our dig at the **Brock riverside cottage** continues, with more amazing features being revealed. Kev's photo below shows more of the paved floor in the northern 'room' despite work being hampered in some areas by tree roots.



Most of the regular Brock team were on site on Saturday 9 April to meet the landowner, Francis Fitzherbert-Brockholes and his wife, Jenny, and to explain what had so far been discovered.

When we began excavation in 2019 the cottage had lain hidden under centuries of accumulated debris, soil and undergrowth, only slight mounds hinting at its existence. The difficulties of the past two years slowed down the dig but a dedicated team has made astonishing progress since last November. However, as much as the excavation has progressed over that period, we're still no nearer a complete understanding of the building and its purpose.

Recent finds of what appears to be fine window-glass and lead frames plus very robust foundations in the southern 'room' suggest a possibly more higher-status habitation than previously thought. The project will continue!
